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SALAR JUNG MUSEUM Brief History & Evolution of The Museum

The Salar Jung Museum of Hyderabad is a repository of the artistic achievements of diverse European, Asian and Far Eastern countries of the world. The major portion of this collection was acquired by Nawab Mir Yousuf Ali Khan popularly known as Salar Jung III. Some of the rare objects were collected by his grand father Nawab Mir Turab Ali Khan, Sir Salar Jung I. The "Veiled Rebecca", an enchanting marble statue and one of the prized possessions of the Salar Jungs, was acquired by him from Rome in 1876. Similar zeal for acquiring art objects continued as a family tradition for three generations. In 1914, Salar Jung III after having relinquished the post of Prime Minister of H.E.H., the Nizam, devoted rest of his entire life in collecting and enriching the treasures of art and literature till his death. The precious and rare art objects collected by him for a period of over forty years, find place in the portals of the Salar Jung Museum. After the demise of Salar Jung-III and in the absence of any direct legal heirs, the vast collection of precious art objects and his Library were housed in the ancestral palaces of the Salar Jungs and the desirability of organizing a museum out of the Nawab's collection dawned quite soon and Sri M.K.Velodi, the then Chief Civil Administrator of the Hyderabad State approached Dr.James Cousins a well known art critic, to organize the various objects of art and curios which were lying scattered in different palaces of Salar Jung III in the form of a museum.

Dr. Cousins suggested to seek the services of Sri G. Venkatachalam, an art critic, for this purpose. Sri Venkatachalam had a formidable task before him in selecting and arranging material which could be







relevant for a museum, from an immense collection. The venue of the proposed museum was to be the "Dewan Deodi" itself, the ancestral palace of the Salar Jungs and the palace where Mir Yousuf Ali Khan lived all his life. The control and the supervision of the affairs of the newly born museum was vested with the Salar Jung Estate Committee. Thereafter, with a view to perpetuate the name of Salar Jung as a world renowned art connoisseur, the 'Dewan Deodi' in the form of

Museum was opened to the public by Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, the then Prime Minister of India on l6th December 1951. Thus, the present Salar Jung Museum was brought into existence. However, the administration of the Museum continued to be vested in the Salar Jung Estate Committee till 1958. Thereafter, the heirs of Salar Jung Bahadur graciously agreed to donate the entire collection to the Government of India through a Compromise Deed based on a High Court Decree on 26th December 1958. The Museum continued to be administered directly by the Government of India till 1961.

In the year 1961 through an Act of Parliament No.26 of 1961 the Salar Jung Museum together with Salar Jung Library was declared to be an` Institution of National Importance` and to provide for its administration and other connected matters the Salar Jung Museum Board was established.

All the art objects which were being taken care of and managed by the Salar Jung Estate Committee were handed over to the Government of India, duly listed in documents. The inventory of the collections listed in the registers were in Urdu language which are the basic records. During the years 1963 and 1964, a set of 109 Inventory Registers were prepared in English on the basis of earlier Registers, along with detailed description, measurements and relevant photographs. Again in 1976, a new set of registers were prepared in English, called Master Ledgers/General Accession Registers, which are the improved version of Inventory Registers.

The Salar Jung's family has a glorious past with great qualities of statesmanship for generations and rich contributions from the family towards the vast collection of art objects, manuscripts and printed books, which now find a place in the museum.

Nawab Mir Yousuf Ali Khan Bahadur Salar Jung – III

Nawab Mir Yousuf Ali Khan's passionate love for curios was known to one and all. His palace was thronged with all those people who had something to sell. Thus, manuscripts, printed books, miniature paintings, calligraphic panels and all sorts of curios were brought to him for his selection. Dealers from different parts of India used to pay periodical visits to his



palace. He was accosted with rare pieces of art as well as copies. For years together, he went on collecting curios and antiques which were housed in several rooms of his palaces. His love towards art took him to Europe and the Middle East countries. The catalogues and lists sent by agents and famous dealers from abroad were perused and sometime made purchases through cable. His last consignment was a set of Ivory chairs, said to belong to Tipu Sultan of Mysore. It is a pity he could not live to see these chairs, since the consignment was received only after his death. Besides collecting curios, manuscripts and books, he also used to patronize poets, writers, artists and encouraged literary, cultural and social activities as well. He was also instrumental for the publication of many books of their family history, for example 'Sher Jung',' Mir Alam/'Riaz-e-Mukhtaria' and 'Muraqqa-e-Delhi', which were dedicated to him. His own biography 'Yousuf-e-Deccan' was published during his lifetime. Thus, it is evident that the treasures which the last Salar Jung inherited were constantly added with the love and zeal of a real collector. This went on for forty years till he passed away on 2nd March, 1949. The then Military Governor declared a public holiday as a mark of respect to this great man, who was a premier noble and Ex-Prime Minister of the old order. The Hyderabad Art Society convened a meeting and passed a resolution of condolence. The Society also resolved that a Museum be opened associated with his name. The friends of late Nawab, Prof. Hussain Ali Khan and Nawab Mehdi Nawaz Jung Bahadur did their best for materializing the idea.

PRESENT STATUS OF THE MUSEUM Location:

The present museum building was constructed on the southern bank of River Musi, which is in close proximity to the important monuments of old city of Hyderabad like the historic Charminar, Mecca Masjid etc. The collections of the Museum and the library were transferred from Dewan Deodi to the new building in the year 1968. As the location of present museum building is easily accessible to everyone, it attracts a continuous flow of visitors from all walks of life. Keeping the vast collection in view, it was proposed to construct two more buildings on either side of the existing building. The two buildings namely Mir Turab Ali Khan Bhavan (Western Block) and Mir Laiq Ali Khan Bhavan (Eastern Block) came up in 2000 AD.

Expansion

The Museum has undertaken construction of additional floors on the Western and Eastern Blocks and completed, by this additional area 20,000 Sq.ft. area was available wherein the Museum is planning to have some more Galleries.

Islamic Art Gallery: Islamic Art Gallery is planned for displaying the Islamic Art / Artefacts from the collection of Salar Jung's. The civil and fabrication works are completed, and interior works are in progress.

Museum Collection

The Museum has a magnificent global collection of art objects and antiques not only of Indian origin, but also of Western, Middle Eastern and Far Eastern origins. Apart from these, there is a Children's section, a rich reference library which contains reference books, large collection of rare manuscripts etc. Thus, this Museum has become popular, not only as a place of enjoyment but also as a repository for education.

GALLERIES

As on date, there are 39 galleries in the Museum in three blocks. The Indian collections are from the States of Telangana, Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Kerala, Orissa, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Punjab, Rajasthan, Himachal Pradesh, Gujarat, Jammu & Kashmir, and places like Kangra, Basholi, Jaipur,

Udaipur, Mewar, Hyderabad, Golconda, Bijapur, Kurnool and Nirmal.

The Western collections are from England, Ireland, France, Belgium, Italy, Germany, Czechoslovakia and Austria.

The Eastern collections are from countries like China, Japan, Burma, Korea, Nepal, Thailand, Indonesia and from Middle East countries like Egypt, Syria, Persia and Arabia. The Indian Art objects comprise of stone sculptures, bronzes, wood carvings, miniature paintings, modern paintings, ivory, jade, textiles, metal ware, manuscripts, bidri, arms and armour, utility ware etc.

List of Galleries

1 Founders Gallery: The portraits and the other personal belongings of the Salar Jungs family are displayed in this gallery. The Portraits of Mir AlamMunir-ul-Mulk-II Mohd Ali Khan, Salar Jung I, Salar Jung II and a good number of oil paintings of Salar Jung III displaying various facets of his personality also adorn this gallery.



2 South Indian Bronzes Gallery: The bronze collections of the Museum belongs to Pallava, Vijayanagara, Chola, periods. Reorganization of the gallery on modern scientific lines was completed.



3. Indian Sculptures Gallery: Though the collection of stone sculptures in the Museum is scanty, yet they are quite significant as they show the characteristic features of the different styles that prevailed in India. An excellent figure of Buddha of 3rd Century AD, the figure of Sesha Sai Vishnu reclining on the serpent bed, and other sculptures displayed in the gallery include Jain figures, Gandhara style Buddha figures and secular pieces. Reorganization of the gallery on modern scientific lines was completed.



4. Minor Arts of South India: Wood carvings occupy a significant place in the history of Indian art. In this gallery the visitors can have a glimpse of wood-carvings of Nirmal work, Metal ware and Ivory carvings. The major part of this gallery house South Indian wood carvings. Reorganization of the gallery on modern scientific lines was completed.



5. Indian Textiles & Mughal Glass: The textile collection of the museum is important and houses a few exquisite examples of tie and dye or Bandhani textiles and a few Patola sarees. The collection of Kalamkari textiles in the museum is one of the richest of its kind in India

and gives a connected stylistic and technical evolution of Kalamkari paintings and prints of Andhra Pradesh.



6. Ivory objects: The Salar Jung Museum has a good collection of ivory carvings from different parts of the world. The collection of ivory gives an excellent idea of ivory as a medium of plastic art. The chessmen, chausar sets of Ivory in the collection form an interesting group.



7. Veiled Rebecca Gallery: This was sculpted in marble by G.B.Benzoni, enveloped in a transparent veil, this master piece acquired by



- Salar Jung I in 1876. This world renowned sculptor, G.B. Benzoni has brought out the bridal bashfulness and youth of Rebecca with his unerring chisel.
- **8.** Walking stick Gallery: This gallery displays a variety of Walking Sticks made out of Cane, Ivory, Bone etc., used by the Salar Jungs.
- 9. Arms and Amour: The arms and amour collection include swords, daggers, battle axes, spears, goads, maces, bows and arrows and gun-powder containers. The defensive weapons include shields, chest plates, helmets and suit of armour belonging to different lands and people. The notable historical personalities whose weapons present in the collection are the Mughal Emperor Aurangazeb, Tippu Sultan, Mohammed Shah and Bahadur Shah.



10. Metal Ware gallery: This gallery showcases Syrian, Persian, Burmese, Japanese, Indian, Russian and English articles of silver, bronze and other metals.



11. Modern Indian Paintings: The works of renowned artists are found in the museum's collection. Raja Ravi Varma was trained in the Western traditions and painted a great deal in oil medium, depicting themes from Indian



mythology and classics incorporating Indian subjects. Only two paintings viz., "The Kerala Beauty" and "Stolen Interview" by Ravi Varma adorn the gallery. The exponents of the Bengal School represented in the collection are Rabindranath Tagore, Nandalal Bose, Chughtai, Behari Mukherjee and VS. Maroji. "Have you not heard his silent steps" and "Musician" the two works of Abanandria Nath are found in the collection of the Museum. Nandalal Bose, one of the pioneers of Modern renaissance of Indian paintings represents a more classic phase of the Bengal School. He is represented by his two important works namely "Vasant" and "Villagers around fire". Among the note- worthy experts who evolved a Neo idiom in art, the museum has in its proud possession the works of artists like M.F. Hussain, K.K. Hebbar, N.S.Bendu, Panikar, K.S. Kulkarni, P.T. Reddy, Paidi Raju and Dinakar Koushik.

12. Indian Miniature Paintings: Some fine examples of Mughal miniatures are displayed in this gallery. The romantic land of Rajasthan contributed the lion's share in the field of miniature paintings. The excellent group of mid-18th century paintings showing Court



scenes, Saints, the procession of a Raja, etc. are from Pahari, Basholi-Kangra region. There are a good number of miniature paintings also to reflect inherent charms and delicacies of the Deccan Qalam. The Museum also possesses a few interesting leaves of early Jain Kalpasutras which bear illustrations in early style of Western Indian paintings, i.e. 14th and 15th centuries A.D.

13. Toys and Dolls: The museum is having good collection of toys & dolls. Toys and dolls collected by Salar Jungs in India have made since the Indus valley collection. The toys of different places have their own individual places and genius. Our craftsmen in older days used to provide children with clay models of wild animals, birds and deities. The toys of Kondapally, Vijayawada have established a great reputation all over the country and abroad. The toys produced were influenced by birds, mythology and daily workers. The style is realistic, but have a rare delicacy of touch with the faces being expressive find place in the gallery.



14. Flora and Fauna gallery: This gallery showcases animals and birds made in metal, marble and porcelain sourced from China, Japan and other European countries.



15. Children Section: The exhibits housed in the section provide informational education to children who visit the gallery. The gallery has a good number of bronze figures, porcelain objects musical boxes, marble sculptures and toys from different parts of the world. Geibha dolls from Japan a functional trainset from England manufactured by Lionel Corp. of USA, 1930 and a set of the seven dwarfs from snow white and seven dwarfs are some of the assortments seen in this section.



16. Arabic and Persian Manuscripts: The Arabic and Persian manuscripts are the most valuable collection of the museum. The earliest manuscription display is a Holy Quran written on parchment in Kufic script and is datable to 9th century A.D. Besides, a number of Holy Qurans both illuminated and embellished adorn the gallery. The other noteworthy manuscripts on display are: the Quartrain of Omar Khayyam written by Sultan Hussain of Persia and autographed by Princess Jehanara Begum, the favourite daughter of Shah Jehan, an illuminated Holy Quran, Shah-nama by Firadausi written by Moh'd-b-Abdul Rahman Sammarqandi (1424 A.D.) etc.



17. French African Gallery: 24 objects displayed in the gallery. African having pipe in the mouth studying news paper is a attraction of the gallery.



18. Indian Silver Gallery: Artifacts rich in Indian enameled and figured objects and filigree creations of Karimnagar (State of Telangana) and Cuttack (Odisha).



19. Carpets: The Persian carpets occupy a unique place in the Museum's middle-eastern art collection. Beautiful specimens with intricate weaving and decked with different ornamental patterns, particularly from all the important looms of Persia, namely Kashna, Bokhara, Tabriz, Kirman, Shiraz etc., are represented in the gallery.



20. Egyptian & Syrian Art: Though the major part of the Egyptian art objects on display are only copies made after the originals from the important tombs of the Egyptian kings. The art objects consist of furniture, appliqué work and ivory carvings. The centre of attraction is the superb replica of Tutankhamen throne datable to 1340 B.C. Though a copy made in 20th century, this throne easily acquaint visitors with workmanship of the original. The Syrian art objects comprise of a good number of furniture items with magnificent workmanship inlayed with mother-of-pearl. A majority of them are inscribed.



21. Jade Gallery: Jade is a semi precious stone, varies in colour from almost pure white, emerald green to a dark black green. The collection includes wine ups (plain and studded with precious stones) plates, cups, book stands, belt buckles, arm rests, fly whisk handles and hair pins, etc. A Jade book-stand having the name of "Shamsuddin Iltamish", an archer ring inscribed with the legend "Sahib-e-Kuran-i-Sani"—title of the Mughal Emperor, Shahjahan are masterpieces. A dagger and a fruit knife made of Jade decorated with precious stones are said to belong to Jehangir and Noorjehan respectively.



22. Bidri Gallery: The word Bidri took its name from the city of Bidar situated about 120 kilometers North West of Hyderabad. The Bidri work was not confined to Bidar but was also practiced at Hyderabad, Lucknow, Pune and to a limited extent in Kashmir also. The design is usually inlaid with silver foils. The bright silver design on a contrasting black body creates excellent effect. The old Bidri ware in the museum is represented by Huqqa bottoms, pandans, trays, surahis, aftabas, vases, etc. Reorganization of the gallery on modern scientific lines was completed.



23. Kashmir Gallery: Kashmir room displays skillful works in paper machine, Ivory, wood, silk and lacquer.



24. Coins Gallery: The museum is having good collection of coins from different periods imperial Magadha, Maurya, Satavahana, Vishnukundi, Western and Eastern Chalukyas were displayed in this gallery. Islamic coinage, Delhi Sultans like Khilji, Tuglaq followed by Bahamani Nizam Shahi, Barid Shahi, Mughals, Qutub Shahi, Asifjahi are also displayed in this gallery.

25. Utility ware Gallery: The artifacts displayed here are Utility ware and Moradabad and Deccani traditional Huqqas, Pandans, a set of tribal arts showing quaint figures and animals.



26. European Furniture: The European furniture forms yet another fascinating group in the collection of European art objects. A wide variety of French furniture comprising of cabinets, consoles, chairs, sofa sets, commodes, elegant screens, table etc. belonging to the period of Louis XIV (1643-1715), Louis XV (1715-44); Louis XVI (1774-92) and Napoleon I adorns the gallery.



27. Chinese Collection: The remarkable Chinese collection of this museum datable from 12th to 19thcenturies. The earliest porcelain ware that reached the outside world was undoubtedly the "Celadon", a ware with a typical grey green glaze. The snuff bottles form an outstanding group. The objects on display in this medium include lacquered and inlaid screens, lacquered boxes, snuff bottles, vases and furniture.

The collection of Chinese ivory in the museum is very interesting for its intricacy and skillful carving. Mostly it comprises figures, a few elaborately carved tusks and lacquered ivory figures that are dateable to 18th to 19th centuries.



28. Far Eastern Porcelain: This gallery displays Chinese porcelains from 12th to 19th centuries, Japanese porcelains from 17th to 19th centuries are exhibited.



29. Japanese Art: Though Japan is looked upon as a natural corollary to China from the standpoint of culture and art history, it has evolved its own identity in the realm of art as well as culture. The earliest pieces in the Museum's collection are blue and white porcelain items dateable to 17th century. The museum has an abundant collection of the popular Satsuma ware consisting of vases, bowls and plates and



also small delicate tea sets of various sizes. The museum possesses Samurai swords with ivory sheaths representing the Katana (large sword) as well as Wakizash, (small sword) and one of them even having a Kodzaka (a small knife used as a missile weapon) fitted into the sheath of a sword.

30. Far Eastern Statuary: The gallery presents an interesting picture of the sculptural art of countries like Nepal and Tibet, which are considered as the countries on the roof-top of the world. The statuary here is distinctly of three mediums, such as bronze, metal and wood. The majority of the objects in the gallery are Buddhist sculptures that show the everlasting impact of Buddhism which has spread from the Indian subcontinent too faraway lands like China and Japan. Beside Buddhist statuary, the gallery also represents a very interesting array of figures of Samurai warriors of Japan.



31&32. Far Eastern Wooden Carving Furniture: A large collection of wood carvings from China, Japan and Burma ranging from 17th to 20th century are represented.



33. European Paintings: Oil and water paintings form an important part of the European collections. They are also reflections of the public taste and artistic interest of the period. The paintings represented in the Museum include the works of Canaletto, Hayez, Blass, Marc Aldine, Diziani, Mattein and a few lesser known painters. Canaletto's oil painting "Piazza San Marco" exhibited in the Salar Jung Museum is a delightful piece, combining beautiful architecture, pleasing forms, pleasant natural scenery and excellent perspective. Hayez's sweet composition 'Soap Bubbles' showing a boy blowing bubbles which are afloat in the air affords much delight to the visitors.



34. European Glass: The museum houses a number of exquisite glass specimens drawn from Venice, France, England, America, Bohemia, Belgium, Turkish and Czechoslovakia. The glass objects from Venice occupy an important place in the collection. The Bohemian glass decanters and bowls were cut and enameled to represent acanthus, floral and scroll designs in baroque style.



- **35. French Gallery:** This provides Baroque, Roccoco, Neo-classical styles of France and Ormolu mounted Sevres porcelains.
- 36. European Clocks: The Salarjung Museum possesses a good number of clocks collected from different European countries such as France, England, Switzerland, Germany, Holland etc. The variety includes the Bird cage clocks, Bracket clocks, Grandfather clocks, Skeleton clocks, etc. The museum is also having some good examples of the clocks of the contemporary period of Louis XV, Louis XVI, and Napoleon 1st of France. The most important clock which attracts the greatest number of visitors everyday is a British Bracket clock. It has got a mechanical device by which a miniature toy figure comes out of an enclosure and strikes the gong and then returns to the enclosure at each hour.
- 37. European Porcelain: The Museum possesses a sizeable collection of Dresden Porcelain and comes next to Sevres collection. An outstanding example of the Dresden porcelain collection is the figure of a tailor and his wife riding a goat. The English porcelain collection is of varied types produced mostly during the 19th century. The outstanding pieces are cups, saucers, plates, vases, hot water plates, figurines etc. The collection includes specimens from the factories like Worcester, Chelsea, Derby, Coalport, Spade, Manchester, Minton, Wedgwood, etc.



38. European Bronzes: The European Bronze images housed in the museum consist of originals as well as copies of some of the well known sculptors which give a fair idea of the popularity. Among the Greek subjects, a copy showing, 'Laocoon and His Sons' stands out for its execution. This subject has influenced the Greek sculptors since ages and the earliest of them date back to 50 B.C. Apart from these, there are many other figures like the Statue of



Liberty, Alexander on horseback, Augustus Caesar, Night Watchman etc., which remind many historical events with which these personalities were associated. Reorganization of the gallery on modern scientific lines is going on.

39. European Marble Gallery: The marble sculptures in the museum are sizable in number though majority of them are garden figures being copies of Greek mythological sculptures done by famous artists. The world renowned sculptor, G.B. Benzoni has brought out the bridal bashfulness and youth of Rebecca with his unerring chisel. Among the others, 'Cleopatra' by Prof. Borione, 'Bebe' by a French sculptor capturing the innocence of a baby, 'Psyche' wife of Cupid who is celebrated for her beauty, are some good examples on view. Two copies of the well known French sculptor, Canora (1757-1822) consisting of Princess Pauline cast as Venus and another figure of Venus are also nice marbles. The marble statues from Italy, France and England form sizeable collection of the Museum. Reorganization of the gallery on modern scientific lines is going on.



STORES

All objects have been segregated material wise viz., Textile, Wooden Furniture, Miniature Paintings, Glass, Porcelean and Paintings etc., and shifted to the new stores which are renovated and upgraded on modern scientific lines with compactors and almirahs to safeguard them physically and from pollution. So far out of 15 stores 12 stores were provided with compactors.





MANUSCRIPTS AND THE LIBRARY

The Salar Jung Museum Library includes a collection of books and manuscripts acquired by the Salar Jung's family. The origin of some of the collection dates back to 1656 A.D. It was given the shape of a well-knit and full-fledged library by Nawab Mir Turab Ali Khan, Salar Jung I, which was further augmented and developed by his son Nawab Mir Laiq Ali Khan, Salar Jung II and finally by Nawab Mir Yousuf Ali Khan, Salar Jung III. The Library and the Manuscripts Sections are situated on the 2nd floor. The rich collection of the Library consists of English, Hindi, Urdu, Telugu, Persian, Arabic and Turkish languages. The English printed books include research journals, albums of rare photographs and valuable engravings. A paramount feature of this vast collection is that it covers a plethora of specialized fields of learning ranging from the fields of Art, Architecture, Archaeology,

Physical, Biological and Social Sciences, Literature, History and Travel. It also includes collection of religious books on Islam, Hinduism, Christianity and other religions. The oldest book in the collection is an English volume printed in 1631 A.D. The library is constantly replenished with latest arrivals covering subjects like Art, Sculpture, Paintings, Ceramic Arts, Decorative Arts, Museology, Tourism etc. Research scholars (both from India and abroad) regularly visit the Library apart from the staff of the Museum. On an average, ten persons a day use the library to enrich and expand the origins of their learning. The collection of outstanding manuscripts in the museum are in Arabic, Persian, Urdu and other languages. The collection also include Calligraphic panels. The richest part of the collection belong to different Iranian and Indian schools such as Bukhara, Isfahan, Shiraz, Tabrez, Qachar, Hearth, Lahore, Kashmir, Punjab, Delhi, Jaipur, Marwar, Gujarat, Company School and Deccani sub-schools such as Golconda, Bijapur, Bidar and Hyderabad. The manuscripts cover a wide range of subjects like History, Biography, Mathematics, Music, Astronomy, Medicine, Philosophy, Physics, Chemistry, Animal Husbandry, Hunting, Military, Science, Law, Literature, the Holy Quran and other related subjects.





Arabic Manuscripts

The library has a collection manuscripts in Arabic, its highlight being that rare work on mathematics entitled 'SharhuMukhtasar al Mukhtasar' on Algebra (847 AD). In astronomy, the earliest work is on the preparation and use of globe (16th cent). In the field of Medicine, a manuscript of Kitabul Qanun by Avicenna (IbnSina) and in Natural History the noted work is *Hayatul Haiwan*. In the field of Philosophy, an encyclopedia work RasialI khwanusSafa (16th cent) is available in the library. Al Tajridfil Mantiq is well known work on logic written by Nasiruddin Tusi (1628 AD) and manuscripts of Ala Sharhil Matali is a copy from the imperial library of Emperor Jahangir. Manuscripts on Islamic theology that deal with Adiyah (Prayers) of Shiites and Sunnites, jurisprudence and Sufism also form a part of the collection. Ta'arruf li Madhabit Tasawwuf is a rare work on introduction to the Principles of Sufism (Delhi-1675 AD). The earliest codex of lexicon is Sahah by Abu Nasr (1218 AD). Jaiul Qawayed is a rare codex in the subject of Syntax (1576 AD) and on the subject of etymology a commentary on As Shafia written during the period of Nizam II is one of the prized possessions of library.

Persian Manuscripts

There are vast collection of Persian language manuscripts. The most outstanding of these is Randatul Muhibbin, which contains twenty illustrations belonging to the Bukhara tradition and was transcribed by the famous calligrapher Mir Ali Harvi. The oldest manuscript on Sunnite commentary is at Basair fil Wujuh wan Nazir, written in 1207 AD, in Arabic Naskh. On Tasawwuf, the most valuable and useful treatise is attributed to Bayazid Bustami, who transcribed it in 1588 AD. There are also manuscripts on the subjects of art, science, divination, astrology, magic and archery. There is one codex on agriculture and a number of codices on precious and semiprecious stones.

On the art of calligraphy the Museum has a number of manuscripts, in cookery there are two manuscripts entitled *Dastur-e-Pukhtan-el-Atamaah* written for Shahjahan. There is a codex on the preparation of perfumes too. In medicine the oldest Arabic translation in Persian is *Tarjuma-e-Minhajul* Mayan written for Shahjahan by Muhammad arradi. The museum also has the oldest medical

encyclopedia transcribed in India. In Veterinary science, the codex *Mualaja-e-Janwaran* is the earliest available manuscript on the treatment of animals and is dedicated to Firoz Shah (1281 AD).

Urdu, Turkish, Pushtu, Hindi and Oriya Manuscripts

Salar Jung Museum has Urdu manuscripts on different subjects in which, *Diwan-e-Quli Qutub Shah* by King Muhammad Quli and *Nurus* by Ibrahim Adil Shah and a rare manuscript entitled '*Lilawati*' on Mathematics and more than 25 manuscripts in Turkish and some Hindi manuscripts are in Persian script and some folios of *Jaina Kalpasutra* and a few palm leaf manuscripts in Oriya, Sanskrit and Telugu on the subjects of History, Medicine, Tantra and Poetry are present.

Visitor Facilities





- The museum has reception center and separate booking counters.
- The museum is having exclusive building for clock room and proposed space for exclusive restaurant with Hyderabad cuisine on the first floor and mini exhibition hall on 2nd floor for conducting mini exhibitions.



- The museum has a full fledged Cafeteria run by Telangana Tourism Department in the main building and a small outlet in the Western Block for the visitors.
- Wheel chairs and toilets have been provided for physically challenged persons.





Multi-Media, Audio Video Visual & Guide facilities: the Museum has introduced touch Screen systems in four galleries with complete information. Museum information system was installed with 65" screen near Entrance.





• Visitors are provided with purified drinking water. Museum has installed R.O. plant connected to all water coolers.



• Sitting benches were provided for the visitors.



• Information and attractive multi-color tickets have been introduced with a brief sketch of the floor plans of three buildings along with signage which can be preserved as book mark by the visitor.



- The lift facility is available for differently abled persons to visit the museum for all the three blocks.
- A ramp at entrances of all buildings are provided.
- General labels and description boards are placed in all the galleries about the artifacts for the hearing impaired.
- A baby feeding room has specially been created and kept for needy visitors facility like air conditioner, sofas with interiors have also been fabricated.
- A water cooler point is available near baby feeding room.

• The museum has developed landscaping and sitting facility for visitors.

OBJECTIVES OF THE MUSUEM

- 1. To preserve and protect the art objects and collections of the Museum.
- 2. To display and showcase the Salar Jung collection and other acquisitions of art objects in the Museum in accordance with international standards.
- 3. to undertake, organize and facilitate lectures, exhibitions, seminars, workshops related to museum collections and art history in collaboration with eminent scholars, cultural institutions, other museums both National and International.
- 4. To maintain and modernize existing galleries displaying art objects in a scientific, aesthetic and public-friendly manner
- 5. To publish literature like research journals, books, brochures, booklet etc. to create awareness about art history and art objects of the Museum among the public.
- 6. To function as a creative meeting place and make the Museum a dynamic cultural organization.

Functions of the Museum

- Functions of the museum are collection, documentation, exhibition, preservation and interpretation of the artistic wealth of the Museum.
- Every year Salar Jung Museum conducts exhibitions suiting to the various occasions.
- In addition to the above the museum also conducts museum week, Children week, summer art camp etc, every year.



Functioning of the Museum

1. Education

Monthly Lectures, Guest Lectures, Gallery Talks, Memorial Lectures.

(C) Other Activities:

Summer Art Camp, Children's Week, Museum Week, World Heritage Week, Salar Jung III Birth Celebration, Museum Formation day, National & International Workshops & Events

(D) Academic Courses:

Post-Graduate Diploma in Museology (in collaboration with Osmania University, Hyderabad). Training programmes for in-personnel & school teachers.

(E) Documentation:

Preparation of Index Cards, Maintenance of Master Ledgers, Computerization of Museum objects, Preparation of Gallery Cds.

2. Publications

Preparation & Printing of Guide Books, Brochures, Pamphlets, Bi-Annual SJM Journal, Preparation & Printing of Museum souvenirs (Post Cards, Posters, CDs, Replicas), etc., Preparation & Printing of Catalogue books and Maintenance of Sales Counters. The operation of Museum Shop has been outsourced to the Handicrafts and Handlooms Export Corporation of India Ltd.

3. Public Relations

Public Relation is the most important factor for any museum. Under this branch a free guide service for the general and the VIP visitors is provided. Suitable amenities for general visitors and people with special need are available. Visitors are provided with suggestions book through which the suggestions of the visitors are taken care. The important activities of the Public Relations are: Museum Guiding, Gallery Talks, Reception, Maintenance of Public Relation with other agencies like ASI, Tourism Dept. etc.

Auditorium

In the western block the museum is having an air conditioned auditorium with 225 seating capacity to organize its academic functions and cultural activities. The museum is also giving the auditorium to organize the academic and related events to the Government Organizations on their request for conducting their official meetings in public interest.

Lecture Hall

In the Eastern Block the museum is having a 'mini lecture hall' with 120 seating capacity to organize the museum academic events like seminars, lectures. The museum is also giving lecture hall to organize academic related events to the Government Organizations on their request to conducting their official meetings in public interest.

Chemical Conservation Wing

The Chemical Conservation Wing plays a very crucial role in safely preserving the precious artifacts from damage and decay. The conservation section with its technical staff is responsible for the preservation and treatment of objects. The Museum has also a preservation unit. The following are the functions of the Chemical Conservation Wing:

- o To examine the artifacts on display in the Galleries and also preserved in the Stores (Reserve collections).
- o To diagnose the cause of damage/decay.
- o To determine the follow up action to be taken for treatment of objects on priority basis and also to decide on the nature of the treatment required.
- o To undertake the treatment of the object which is in the nature of both curatorial as well as preventive.



Engineering Wing

An Engineering Wing has been established in the year 1994 to (i) supervise the execution of both Civil and Electrical works, (ii) look after the conservancy, (iii) maintain building which includes water supply, sewerage, air conditioning and development of gardens. Presently, the Engineering Wing is associated in the ongoing project of re-organization of galleries.

Solar Power Plant

The museum had installed and commissioned solar power plant 650 KwP with the assistance of Telangana New & Renewable Energy Development Corporation Limited (TNREDCL). The museum is saving around 60 lakhs per annum on electrical charges with the installation of Solar Power plant.

Museum Staff

The curatorial staff consists of Curators, Deputy Curators, and Gallery Assistants. Their main function is to ensure proper safe custody of the artifacts both on display and in the Stores (reserve collections) and their documentation, maintenance of galleries & reserve collection. Curators are responsible for display and looking after gallery arrangements. Besides, there is also a Photography section. The Senior Guide Lecturer and Guide Lecturers conduct guided tours to the visitors and deliver lectures on the origin and importance of the museum and its objects on display.

Constitution of the Salar Jung Museum Board

The affairs of the Museum are managed by the Salar Jung Museum Board consisting of the Hon'ble Governor of Telangana as Ex-Officio Chairman with ten members representing the Government of India and State Government of Telangana as its members. Out of 11 Members Five are Ex-officio, and Six are nominated members.

The Board is assisted by Four Committees i.e Executive, Finance, Building Advisory and Museum Development Committees to take decision in the matters relating to administrative, financial and developmental activities

Composition of the Board is as Under:

- (a) The Governor of Telangana, ex-Officio Chairman;
- (b) The representative of the Government of India in the Ministry concerned, dealing with matters relating to the Salar Jung Museum, not below the rank of Dy. Secretary ex-officio Member
- (c) The Mayor of the Corporation of Hyderabad, ex-officio; Member
- (d) The Vice-Chancellor of the Osmania University, ex-officio; Member
- (e) The Accountant General, Telangana ex-officio; Member

Significant Accounting Policies:

1. The Salar Jung Museum is maintaining the Accounts as per Section 21 of Salar Jung Museum Act 1961 and in the form prescribed by the Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure. The accounts are prepared on accrual basis and in accordance with the directions issued from time to time by the Central Government in consultation with the C & A.G of India. The Financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention.

2. Recognition of Grants from Government of India:

Grants are recognised as 'Revenue' or 'Capital' on the basis of their sanction / utilisation. The expenditure on Capital and Revenue accounts has been shown separately in Receipts & Payments Account for the year, as per provisions under GFRs. The Grants have been accounted for on actual receipt basis.

3. Fixed Assets:

Fixed Assets are valued at cost of acquisition inclusive of all incidental and other direct expenses related to the acquisition.

4. **Depreciation:**

- a. Depreciation was not provided on Assets acquired from Grant funds for the years from 1981-82 to 1999-2000, considering the fact that the Museum is a Non-Commercial body receiving grants from Central Government and the replacement of Assets can be made from fresh grant received from Government of India. However, on the advice of the Ministry (GOI), depreciation has been provided on the Assets with effect from the Accounting year 2000-01 at the rates prescribed under schedule XIV of Companies Act, 1956, on Straight line method. In FY 2020-21, the museum shifted from Schedule XIV of Companies Act, 1956 to Schedule II to Companies Act 2013 for charging depreciation.
- b. The depreciation is being provided on all the assets except on Library Books, Manuscripts, Microfilms etc., and Art Objects taken over from Salar Jung Estate and also Art Objects purchased by the Museum.

5. Value of Art Objects:

Value of the Art Objects, Furniture & Fixtures, Books, Manuscripts etc., taken over from the Salar Jung Estate through Andhra Pradesh High Court were not shown in the Balance Sheet as their values are not known. However, Art Objects acquired subsequently are shown at Cost.

- 6. No provision is made in the books of account against the liability for Leave encashment and Gratuity of employees of Museum. They are, however, accounted on cash basis.
- 7. The GPF accounts of the Museum employees are maintained separately and are appended.

2. Revalidation of Grants:

The unspent grant amount of Rs.80,59,194/- has been shown as current liabilities in annual accounts.

3. Depreciation:

- (i) The depreciation is provided in the books of accounts as per the Useful lifes prescribed in the Schedule II to Companies Act 2013.
- (ii) The subsidy amount of Rs.98,00,330, Rs 14,82,300 and Rs.7,35,000 (at 30% project cost of solar plant) released through TSREDCo for 600 KWp in the years 2017-18, 2018-19 and 2019-20 respectively by GOI, Ministry of Non-Renewable Energy has been treated as 'Capital reserve' in the respective years (see Schedule 2) and the portion of the reserve amount is being transferred to 'Income & Expenditure' account corresponding to the amount of depreciation charged for the year..
- 4. Land: Under schedule 8 (Fixed Assets) Land admeasuring 10 Acres and 62 Cents, valued at Rs.17,95,603 includes a sum of Rs 9,43,903 paid by the Museum towards the cost of land acquired and the land valued at Rs.8,51,700 donated to the Museum.

5. Fund Related to New Pension Scheme:

- i) In response to the Government of India instructions issued to Autonomous Bodies (vide letter no. I (13) EV/2008, dated 30.01.2009), the Salar Jung Museum has given its consent (vide letter No.SJM/Estt/NPS/2009-75, dated 06.04.2009) to join in the New Pension Contributory scheme and is being implemented from 2009-10.
- ii) An amount of Rs.9,55,696/- (previous year Rs.10,05,678/-) is recovered towards Employee's contribution to the New Pension scheme during the current year and deposited with the Pension Regulatory Authority together with equal contribution by the Museum.
- 6. Interest accrued from the Earmarked / Endowment funds has been transferred to respective Fund accounts.
- 7. As per the instructions issued by Ministry of Culture (GOI), the interest earned on Savings and deposit accounts is payable to the Ministry/GOI. The interest earned during the year on savings account (Rs.4,69,614/-)..

8. GST

- a. GST paid to Government on 'Cost of Deployment' of CISF personnel remained to be claimed back in the earlier years under 'Reverse Charge Mechanism (RCM) which has resulted in credit balance with the Government. GST collected on rents etc., during the year has not been remitted to Government for adjustment of the credit balance with the Government.
- b. GST to be claimed on the lease rents accrued and due from the shops amounting to Rs.1,00,667/- is not provided in the accounts in view of the above.
- 9. Previous year figures have been regrouped, rearranged, reclassified wherever necessary...
- 10. Figures in rupees are rounded off to nearest rupees and shown.

Separate Audit Report on the Accounts of Salar Jung Museum, Hyderabad (SJM), for the year ended 31 March 2022

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of Salar Jung Museum, Hyderabad (SJM), as at 31 March 2022, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. These financial statements are the responsibility of the SJM's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cumperformance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- **4.** Based on our audit, we report that:
- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
- ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments
 Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the Format of
 Financial Statements for the Central Autonomous Bodies (Non-Profit

Organizations and Similar Institutions), prescribed by Ministry of Finance, Government of India.

- iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the SJM, Hyderabad as required under in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- iv. We further report that:

1.4 Comments on Accounts:

A. Balance Sheet

A.1 Corpus/Capital Fund and Liabilities – ₹54.61 crore

A.1.1. Current liabilities and provisions: ₹1.22 crore

A.1.1.1 Despite being pointed out in previous Separate Audit Report, on the Annual Accounts 2020-21(comment A.1.1.1 of SAR on the Annual Accounts, 2020-21), regarding the incorrect accounting of GST payments, SJM persisted with the incorrect accounting of the following disclosure and accounting in the Annual Accounts for 2021-22 also.

A disclosure about GST payments was made at point 8(a) of Schedule-24A stating that 'GST paid on Government on cost of deployment of CISF personnel remained to be claimed back in the earlier years under Reverse Charge Mechanism(RCM) was in credit balance with the Government. Therefore, GST collected on rents etc. during the year has not been remitted to Government for adjustment of the credit balance with the Government'.

During the year 2021-22, Museum had an outstanding liability of GST of ₹9,44,090 to be paid to GST department during the year. Since there was credit balance of ₹2,39,85,086 the amount of GST payable of ₹9,44,090 was incorrectly adjusted against the ITC of GST. Hence, there was net credit balance of GST of ₹2,30,40,996 (₹2,39,85,086 - ₹9,44,090) available to the end of March 2022. This resulted in understatement of both Current Liabilities and Provisions and Current Assets, Loans and Advances to an extent of ₹2.30 crore.

Further, it was also disclosed (point 8(b) of Schedule-24A) that GST to be claimed on the lease rents accrued and due from the shops amounting to ₹1,00,667 is not

provided in the accounts in view of the above. Non-providing of the statutory liability is incorrect.

A.2. Current Assets, Loans and Advances: ₹2.50 crore

A.2.2 As per the certified Annual Accounts for the year 2020-21, the closing balance in respect of Current Accounts was ₹1,19,63,283 and Savings account was Nil. However, in the Annual accounts 2021-22 the opening balances were incorrectly depicted as opening balances of (-) ₹17,40,731 in Current Account and ₹1,37,04,014 in Saving Account the amounting to a total(net) opening bank balance of ₹1,19,63,283. The fact of netting of bank accounts needs to be disclosed in the Annual Accounts in the Notes on Account for clarity and transparency.

B. Income and Expenditure Account

B.1 Income :₹31.71 lakh

B.1.1. Bad debts written off amounting to ₹7,39,957 (₹5,01,957 towards lease rent from cycle stand and ₹2,38,000 towards rent from Hyderabad cafe) were not accounted as expenses in the Income and Expenditure Account under Schedule 21 under Other Administrative Expenses etc. These were however, incorrectly accounted as deduction from Other Income under Schedule 18. This resulted in short accountal of both Income and Expenditure by ₹7.39 lakh besides non-compliance of accounting as stipulated by Format of Financial Statements for the Central Autonomous Bodies (Non-Profit Organizations and Similar Institutions).

B. 2 Expenditure:

B.2.1. Due to Misclassification (error or Principle), of expenses which were Capital (non-recurring) in nature as Revenue expenditure(recurring), they were incorrectly debited to Income and Expenditure account which resulted in incorrect accounting of expenditure. This led to incorrect arrival of deficit which was in excess by ₹5,08,513. As the expenditure on procurement of Fixed Assetswas incorrectly treated as revenue expenses, this resulted in understatement of fixed assets and overstatement of revenue expenses.

B.2.2. As per the Format of Financial Statements for the Central Autonomous Bodies (Non-Profit Organisations and Similar Institutions), 'Prior period and Extraordinary items shall be separately disclosed so that the effect thereof on the net expenditure for the year is known'.

However, in contravention to these stipulations, it was observed that the items of expenditure pertaining to previous year 2020-21, were incorrectly accounted for as current year expenditure under Other Administrative Expenses in Income and Expenditure account resulting in overstatement of Other Administrative expenses and understatement of Prior Period expenditure to the extent of ₹6,41,463.

C. General

- 1. During scrutiny of Fixed Asset Register it was observed that there are no separate entries for all the assets purchased during the year. The total additions of the assets under their respective category was entered in the Register without giving the description of each item and their cost.
- 2. Retirement Benefits were not provided on the basis of actuarial valuation despite being pointed out in SAR for the Annual Accounts 2019-20 (General Point 3 of SAR 2019-20)
- 3. Cash books are not maintained separately for each bank account though pointed out in previous SAR for the Annual Accounts 2019-20 (General Point 2 of SAR 2019-20)
- 4. Income and Expenditure Account has not been prepared for GPF accounts even though pointed out in the previous SAR for the Annual Accounts 2018-19 (General Point 4 of SAR 2018-19)
- 5. In the Income and Expenditure Account, accounting of the Grants-in-aid was not done as prescribed by the format of accounts.
- D. **Grants-in-aid:** Out of total Grants-in-aid of ₹30.86 crore¹received during the year with Nil Opening Balance, the Museum utilised a sum of ₹30.05 crore², leaving a balance of ₹0.81 crore as at the end of 31March 2022.

¹(i)General: ₹16.74 crore (ii) Capital Assets: ₹1.00 crore, (iii) Salaries : ₹12.70 crore (iv) Swachh Bharat ₹0.02 crore, and (iv) Global Summit ₹0.40 crore

²(i) General Expenditure: ₹16.31 crore, (ii) Capital Assets during the year: ₹1.00 crore (ii)Salaries, ₹12.41 crore, (iii)Swachh Bharat: ₹0.02 crore and (iv) Global Summit: ₹0.31 crore.

E. Management Letter

Deficiencies meriting attention of Management have been brought to the notice of the Director, Salar Jung Museum, through a Management Letter issued separately for remedial / corrective action.

- v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account/Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi.In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:
 - a. In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of Salar Jung Museum, Hyderabad as at 31 March 2022; and
 - **b.** In so far as it relates to Income & Expenditure Account of the *Deficit* for the year ended on that date.
